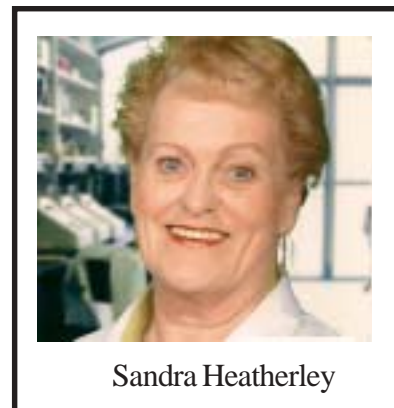
Bryan Bode actually made a touchdown by acting as judge, timekeeper, and scorekeeper for the competition.

Reflections on the 2013 March on Washington

My March on Washington by Coretta Graham

On a hot, hot Saturday morning on August 24, in Washington, D. C., I participated in an historic event on the National Mall... A March on Washington for Jobs, Justice and Freedom.

I was not alive in 1963 (when the first March was held). So, as a member of LWV, NAACP, and Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.-a national sisterhood of black college-educated women committed to public service, I took a 19+ hour bus ride on Greyhound from Corpus Christi to Washington, D.C.to arrive at 3:30 am. Fortunately, I was able to stay with my sorority sister from the Bronx who had a hotel room near the National Mall.

Fifty years ago, civil rights groups, labor union, and social justice activists gathered together in Washington, D. C., to bring attention to the same issues. The moment became an opportunity to remember the 1963 March on Washington for older people, and a new charge for younger people to continue the dream, aspirations, and mandates from 1963.

After some much-needed rest, I joined with a contingency of sorority sisters to walk to the Lincoln Memorial. It was a very long walk from Foggy Bottom Metro Exit. The program started at 8 am with an ecumenical service. We arrived by 9am and made our way to the front of over 200,000 people where other sorority sisters gathered, including our National officers and past National presidents.

Leaders from various groups, including LULAC, NAACP, NAN, Civil Rights Committee, and Black Congressional Caucus gave 2-minute speeches on voting rights and mobilizing our communities for change. Tony Bennett provided a song. Living Legends Congressman John Lewis and Rev. Lowery gave reflections. The highlight was Rev. Sharpton and Martin Luther King III's charge to continue to fight for the dream of equality.

Overall, it was very inspiring to see so much diversity, many young people, mothers and fathers with their kids, and no violence.

Here's the Ballot Wording for the Nine Constitutional Amendments on Fall Ballot

Texas Secretary of State John Steen has selected the ballot order for the nine proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on as part of the November 5, 2013, election.

The amendments will appear in the following order:

Proposition 1 (HJR 62)

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of all or part of the market value of the residence homestead of the surviving spouse of a member of the armed services of the United States who is killed in action.

Proposition 2 (HJR 79)

The constitutional amendment eliminating an obsolete requirement for a State Medical Education Board and a State Medical Education Fund, neither of which is operational.

Proposition 3 (HJR 133)

The constitutional amendment to authorize a political subdivision of this state to extend the number of days that aircraft parts that are exempt from ad valorem taxation due to their location in this state for a temporary period may be located in this state for purposes of qualifying for the tax exemption.

Proposition 4 (HJR 24)

The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for an exemption from ad valorem taxation of part of the market value of the residence homestead of a partially disabled veteran or the surviving spouse of a partially disabled veteran if the residence homestead was donated to the disabled veteran by a charitable organization.

Proposition 5 (SJR 18)

The constitutional amendment to authorize the making of a reverse mortgage loan for the purchase of homestead property and to amend lender disclosures and other requirements in connection with a reverse mortgage loan.

Proposition 6 (SJR 1)

The constitutional amendment providing for the creation of the State Water Implementation Fund for Texas and the State Water Implementation Revenue Fund for Texas to assist in the financing of priority projects in the state water plan to ensure the availability of adequate water resources.

Proposition 7 (HJR 87)

The constitutional amendment authorizing a home-rule municipality to provide in its charter the procedure to fill a vacancy on its governing body for which the unexpired term is 12 months or less.

Proposition 8 (HJR 147 and SJR 54)

The constitutional amendment repealing Section 7, Article IX, Texas Constitution, which relates to the creation of a hospital district in Hidalgo County.

Proposition 9 (SJR 42)

The constitutional amendment relating to expanding the types of sanctions that may be assessed against a judge or justice following a formal proceeding instituted by the State Commission on Judicial Conduct.

LWV-Texas Providing Weekly News Release on Amendments

LWV-TX, utilizing grant monies provided by the Texas Bar Association, will issue weekly news releases to provide non-partisan information on each of the nine amendments on the Nov. 5 ballot. The purpose will be to encourage Texans to vote in an election that typically draws only a small percentage of voters, especially when no candidates are on the ballot.

More than 250 news media outlets and newspapers throughout the state will receive the news release.

Linda Krefting, LWV-TX president, said "the issues at stake affect all Texans now and in the future, from property tax exemptions to funding the water state plan. Given the significance of the issues and relative permanence of constitutional amendments, voters need to understand each of the propositions to cast an informed vote."

Photo ID Required to Vote in Person in Elections

LWV-Texas has posted the following information on its website as a handy reference on what photo IDs are required to vote in person in Texas elections:

Texas now requires one of 7 photo IDs at the polls:

Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) issued

- Driver's license
- Personal identification card
- Concealed handgun license
- Election identification certificate (EIC)

U.S. government issued

- Military identification card with photograph
- Citizenship certificate or naturalization with photograph
- Passport

- Photo ID needs to be current or have expired no more than 60 days before voting (citizenship and naturalization certificates have no expiration date).
- The name on the ID should match the voter registration card. If names don't match, a voter may be accepted if names are "substantially similar." Addresses need not match.
- Voters with a documented disability can apply for a voter registration certificate exempting them from the photo ID requirement.

- Voters without acceptable ID can obtain an Election Identification Certificate (EIC) from Texas DPS at no cost by providing proof of citizenship and identity and registering to vote at DPS or showing a voter registration card.

- Voters who do not show an acceptable ID at the polls can vote a provisional ballot and have 6 days to show the required photo ID.

- Photo ID is not required to vote by mail. Voters may apply for a mail ballot if 65 or older, ill or disabled, or absent from their county during early voting and on election day.

Only the 7 photo IDs above can be accepted at the polls. Other photo IDs including student IDs and employer IDs cannot be accepted

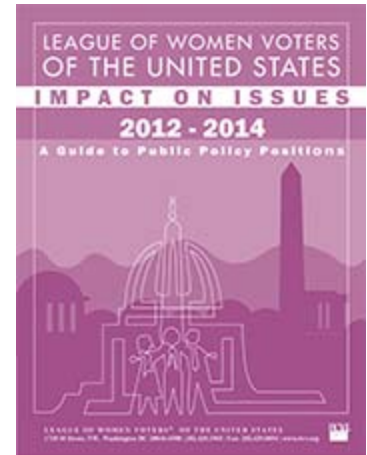
